## Red Cross Provides Ongoing Support to Tornado Survivors

In the months since a deadly tornado outbreak ripped across the South and the Midwest, compassionate American Red Cross volunteers and employees have worked around the clock to aid people whose lives were forever changed by this disaster. Throughout the region, we have provided safe shelter, warm meals, relief supplies and emotional support to help survivors in the aftermath of this tragedy.

Our support lasts long after the clouds clear, often including additional financial assistance to bridge the gap between hardship and recovery. So far, we have distributed these funds to over 1,500 families, helping them replace furniture and other items destroyed by the tornadoes, secure new housing and pay for other necessities. As we look ahead, long-term recovery funds will be used to help survivors repair and rebuild their homes and communities. With the extraordinary commitment of our donors, the Red Cross will continue to support the long-term recovery needs of those affected and their communities in the weeks and months ahead.

## Generous Donors Help Make Recovery Possible

Thanks to our generous donors, the Red Cross has raised nearly \$48.2 million, including the value of critical donated goods and services, to help people affected by the December 2021 Southern and Midwest Tornadoes. As of March 10, 2022, the Red Cross had already spent or made commitments to spend approximately \$15.9 million on emergency relief and recovery efforts for these storms. We will continue to program the remaining funds to provide and support services for both individual and community long-term recovery in the impacted regions.

They include the people and systems to maintain our enterprise-wide computer and telecommunications, HR and payroll systems to support more than 17,000 employees and nearly 300,000 volunteers, fundraising and communications functions, and other support services across all program lines. 90 cents of every dollar spent for Southern and Midwest Tornadoes will support delivering care and comfort to help people affected by these storms.
