Thanks for rising to the challenge

t's certainly been a busy disaster-filled few months with wildfires, hurricanes (even on the West Coast), and tornadoes, to name a few. We would like to take a mo-

ment and recognize and thank all of our volunteers who have helped families during these extremely tough times here at home and across the country.

So far this summer, we have opened 11 shelters and evacuation centers in our region including in Kalispell, Columbia Falls, Polson, Arlee, Ronan, Plains, Ovando, Pryor and Orofino during wildfires; in Hardin following flooding; and in Helena for a multi-unit apartment fire.

So many volunteers have raised their hands to assist with large national disasters as well, including the devastating Maui wildfires, Typhoon Mawar and tornadoes across the South. Since June 1, more than 40 volunteers from our region have deployed at home and across the country, some of them more than once.

Thank you once again for answering the call and hitting the road when the emergency siren sounds. We know this work is never easy but the impact can't be overstated.

BLOOD DECLINE: Red Cross has seen a concerning decrease in blood donations over the past few months and is urging donors to make an appointment to give the gift of life.

Approximately 29,000 units of red blood cells are needed every day in the U.S. to keep pace with patient need.

A blood donation takes less than an hour from start to finish, and a single donation can save more than one life. Accident victims, cancer patients, expecting moms and many others are counting on us to keep hospital shelves stocked with lifesaving blood products.

AMERICORPS: Our region is recruiting six AmeriCorps members to support our mission — three in Yellowstone County in Montana and three in the Treasure Valley in Idaho.

AmeriCorps is a national service program, like a domestic Peace Corps. This is a full-time contracted volunteer position for 10.5 months.

These members will focus their service on recruiting and engaging volunteers and educating communities on emergency readiness.

Members will also have the opportunity to assist with local disaster operations.

Members will receive a bi-weekly stipend of \$869 as well as health care and dental coverage.

They are also eligible to apply for SNAP benefits.

They also can earn a \$6,895 education award at the end of their term which can be used toward student loans or future tuition.
