Responding to Current Large Disasters

Thanks to your commitment, we were ready to respond immediately to urgent crises across the country when we were needed most.



In October, nearly five months after **Hurricane Idalia** struck the **Southeast**, the Red Cross launched another round of financial assistance to help bridge the gap for qualifying households struggling to overcome ongoing barriers to recovery, including childcare costs, food insecurity, health/mental health needs, housing, transportation and more. To date, we have distributed more than \$800,000 in Bridge Financial Assistance.

Beginning in December, a string of dangerous winter storms and severe rainfall caused flash floods across Connecticut, Maine, New Jersey and Rhode Island, prompting evacuations as temperatures plummeted to record-breaking cold conditions. In response, Red Cross teams opened shelters across the Northeast a number of which continue to operate today — provided meals to impacted communities and supported families beginning to plan their path to recovery.



Hawaii Wildfires Update

Wildfires Made Impact: August 2023

Wildfires swept across Maui and the Island of Hawaii, forcing thousands to flee their homes.

Our Response:

- In the aftermath, Red Crossers delivered critical aid as residents coped with unthinkable losses.
- Months after the fires, we continued to support displaced survivors sheltering in area hotels, ensuring they had warm meals, relief items, and access to health and mental health services.
- As of November 8, we had reached an estimated 18,200 people with disaster relief and recovery services, including more than \$25 million in financial assistance.

In August 2023, deadly wildfires swept across Maui and the Island of Hawaii, forcing thousands to flee their homes.

In October 2023, the Red Cross began providing **bridge financial assistance** to support hard-hit individuals and families who were still facing barriers to recovery.

For survivors like Mahina Ah Sam, this additional aid is a critical lifeline, allowing her to repair her car, as well as get food, clothing and other essentials.

2023 Southern and Midwest Tornadoes Update

Tornadoes Made Impact: March-May 2023

Over a dozen **tornadoes** ripped through the **South and Midwest**, impacting tens of thousands of people.

Our Response:

- Red Cross workers sprang into action across
 14 states to provide immediate relief and comfort.
- Six months after the tornadoes, Red Cross volunteers were still delivering hot meals and more to hotel shelter residents in Mississippi every day.
- To date, we'd reached an estimated 14,400 individuals with recovery services, including financial assistance to help with unmet needs.

2021 Southern and Midwest Tornadoes Update

Tornadoes Made Impact: December 2021

A spate of **powerful tornadoes** ripped across communities in the **South and Midwest**.

Our Response:

- Hundreds of Red Cross workers rolled up their sleeves to aid hard-hit communities in Arkansas, Kentucky, Missouri and Tennessee.
- We provided shelter, relief and comfort, plus over \$7.5 million in financial assistance to meet immediate needs and support recovery.
- Today, we are funding grants to local partner organizations, with an emphasis on unmet housing needs — a huge barrier to recovery for survivors.



MORE THAN 2,000 LIVES SAVED — AND COUNTING

Our Home Fire Campaign reached an incredible milestone in recent months: **2,000 lives saved** through our prevention and education outreach! Thanks to our generous donors, dedicated volunteers and community partners, we have, since 2014:

- Installed over 2.7 million smoke alarms.
- Made 1.1 million homes safer.

This vital work continues, with *Sound the Alarm* events happening throughout the country all the time.

Ensuring Blood Is on the Shelves for Emergencies Like Childbirth: As many as 60,000 people in the U.S. are affected by severe maternal morbidity, and up to 3% of birthing parents receive unplanned, lifesaving blood transfusions postpartum. In moments like these — when every second counts — the Red Cross is there. During the last quarter, the Red Cross distributed 1.6 million units of blood to people in need. Your generosity and financial support are imperative to ensuring a robust blood supply is available when patients need it most.

Sickle Cell Initiative

HBCU's on a Lifesaving Mission with the American Red Cross

- Alabama A&M University and Alabama State
 University have teamed up with the Red Cross since
 2017 to see who can recruit the most blood
 donors ahead of the annual Magic City Classic
 football game in October.
- Through the efforts of these Historically Black
 Colleges & Universities (HBCUs), this year's blood
 drive goal was exceeded by nearly 140 donations
 and attracted over 200 first-time blood donors —
 an incredible and historic feat.
- The Magic City Classic Blood Drive, held each fall, allows the Red Cross to rally blood donors who are Black to support the blood transfusion needs of sickle cell disease patients.

Dennis Hendrickson's son, Jack, had a tough start in life. As a toddler, he battled cancer and relied on lifesaving blood donations to survive. Hendrickson witnessed the positive effects of blood transfusions on his son firsthand. Now 29 years old, Jack is healthy and thriving. Hendrickson made a commitment to donate his blood, so someone else could experience the rejuvenation that his son received from the blood donations. As the need for platelets to help people battling cancer and other illnesses grows, the Red Cross is investing in new Blood Donation Centers to grow blood and platelet collections.
