About

Bring your own device and get ready to learn about fire safety and preparedness!

Detailed Timeline

Step 1: Logistics Planning [1 Month Prior]

Reach out to your local Red Cross unit and find a contact – ideally someone involved in disaster services – that can guide you to resources that will make your event impactful and successful.

Decide on a video calling platform. Examples include Microsoft Teams, Zoom, and Google Meet.

Step 2: Event Development [3 Weeks Prior]

Develop activity ideas – here are some to get you started:

- Create a game about making a home fire escape plan. For the worksheet, click [here](#).
- Invite a guest speaker, such as a local Red Cross unit representative/volunteer or firefighter.
- Create a trivia game about fire safety. One recommended platform is Kahoot.

Step 3: Promotion & Organization [2 Weeks Prior]

Team up with other Red Cross Clubs or organizations in your community to increase involvement.
