## CLARA BARTON'S DRESS RESTORATION AND A HISTORY OF 19<sup>TH</sup>-CENTURY FASHION

A remarkable piece of history—a dress that belonged to American Red Cross founder Clara Barton—is now on display at our national headquarters in Washington, D.C. Clara's dress, which was designed to convey respectability and gravitas, was most likely worn by Clara when she met with members of the U.S. Congress and military generals or when she gave speeches. Thanks to Clara's great-great-grandniece, Sue Stafford, for graciously donating the dress to the Red Cross and to longtime Red Crosser and Tiffany Circle National Council Torchbearer, **Barbara Bovende**

National Council Torchbearer, **Barbara Bovender**, who made the restoration and display of this artifact possible.

When asked why the restoration project resonated with Barbara, she shared, "This dress is a piece of history. Clara's dress embodies the history of nursing and the history and founding of the American Red Cross. Clara Barton was an amazing role model—and was truly a woman before her time. It was an honor to support the restoration and installation of this historical artifact."

Drawn to fabrics and fashion, supporting the dress restoration was a natural fit for Barbara. "My mom, another strong woman, was a seamstress. Textiles and sewing were an integral part of our livelihood and my upbringing." Barbara reminisced on learning to sew and sourcing fabrics with her mother. Barbara then reflected on realizing the conservation of Clara Barton's dress, "I wish she could just see this. She would be so proud."

"I am excited that Clara Barton's dress is now able to be viewed by Red Cross volunteers,
