"She Gasped and Came Back": Lifesaving Pharmacist Honored in the Red Cross Northern Ohio Region

When a fellow employee ran into the pharmacy shouting that someone had collapsed at the North Olmstead Discount Drug Mart, Matt Kirby ran to the deli section to assess the scene. Using



lifesaving skills he learned in a Red Cross course for his job, he began CPR on the woman, who was not breathing and had no pulse. On his 22nd chest compression, the customer was revived. She was transported to a hospital and recovered to celebrate her 50th wedding anniversary just one week later. For his actions, Matt was awarded the Lifesaving Award for Professional Responders on March 28, 2022 and gained some new grandparents. While on vacation in North
Carolina, college student Travis
Shrout noticed a mother and son in
seeming distress far from shore.
The former lifeguard handed off his
boogie board to the mother then
swam after her young son.

Treading water amidst the waves and rip current, all while keeping



the duo calm, Travis concocted a plan. He got them close enough to shore to secure another floatation device, then worked with others to tow them past the current to safety. The entire scene was captured on incredible drone footage. "I felt that anyone else in my situation would have done the same thing," said Travis. He was honored March 3, 2022 with the Certificate of Merit from the National Lifesaving Awards Program and an Acts of Courage Award from the Northern Ohio region. Paramedic Tabitha Parker taught her daughter, Peyton, what to do if




someone was choking on food, never expecting that the 8-year-old girl would use it to save her dad's life. But that's exactly what happened this past January when Peyton's father began choking on a sandwich. She wrapped her arms around her dad and gave him two abdominal thrusts. The sandwich cleared and before long the family was back to playing video games. No other adults were home that day since Tabitha was at work, making Peyton's actions even more impressive. Last month, she was awarded the Certificate of Extraordinary Personal Action by the Red Cross, recognized by the chapter in this <u>Facebook post</u>.

Lifesaving Awards Vault

From the vault of the Hartford Courant, November 28, 1948

Direct from the newspaper's vault: A light seaplane piloted by Paul F. Jarvis, 20,

Three Get Awards For Saving Flyer At Columbia Lake

plunged into Columbia Lake in Connecticut on August 2, 1948. Guy Beck, a 20-year old college student, and George Marsh dove into the water to release Jarvis from the cockpit, where he was trapped, unconscious. Although bystanders thought Jarvis was dead, B. Brainard Bell, a 27-year old Red Cross First Aid instructor, insisted on starting CPR. Jarvis regained consciousness and was discharged from the hospital two weeks after the crash. For their lifesaving actions, all three men received the Certificate of Merit. It was Bell's second recognition that year from the Red Cross, having received a Certificate of Appreciation and the Red Cross Service Medal earlier for contributing more than 500 hours of volunteer work.
