### Daughter Saves Father's Life in the Greater New York Region

When Madison Engel's father collapsed in his driveway en route to the cardiologist, he was blessed to have his daughter working from home that day. Walking past the front door, she observed him fall to the ground in a cardiac arrest. She called 911, then raced out

# **Richard Clark**

This month we recognize Richard Clark, an Instructor at the Rescue Mission Alliance in the Eastern New York region. In August, 10 of Richard's students were honored for using their First Aid/CPR/AED training for save the lives of multiple residents in their care.



Lifesaving Awards Vault

From the vault of the Baxter Bulletin (Mountain Home, Arkansas), December 12, 1985



Jack Wilson, president of the Baxter County Chapter of the American Red Cross,

presented the Certificate of Merit to local citizens who, earlier that year in two separate incidents, used their Red Cross training to save two lives.

- On February 27, 1985, Philip Hahn responded to an intercom announcement at a bowling alley for someone who knew CPR. He immediately left his league team and began two-person CPR on an unresponsive bowler. Philip handled rescue breathing while the other responder, a high school student who the Red Cross has not been able to identify, performed compressions.
- In August 1984, Ranger Ron Sallee was chatting on the dock of Bull Shoals Lake when he heard a splash. A 7-year-old boy had fallen, coming up for air once before starting to sink again. Ron remembered being trained by the Red Cross to "stay and throw, don't go." With this in mind, he decided not to jump into the water, but rather get down on his hands and knees so he could reach out, grab the boy and pull him up onto the dock.
