This month, the Red Cross of South Carolina proudly presented Master State Trooper David Jones with the highest honor bestowed by the American Red Cross: the National Lifesaving Award Certificate of Merit. Last May,

Jones heard a neighbor's child screaming that her brother was dead. Jones ran outside and saw the mother retrieving her two-year-old from the pool. She handed the little boy to Jones, who began delivering back blows and rescue breaths. As a result, the child began coughing up water and fluttering his eyelashes before EMS arrived. Off-duty Firefighters in Michigan Region Come to the Rescue

"We were getting ready to go out for the day and one of the neighbors across from the cabin where we were staying alerted us that there were several people in the cabin not breathing," said Frank. Frank, Knopf and Bechtel ran to check the situation and began CPR, continuing until local first responders got there with the Michigan state police. While the fire department's press release stated that the trio "saved families from an unsufferable loss," Frank responded, "We just assisted the local municipalities up there and performed CPR until they got pulses back and the individuals breathing." High School Student in Northern Ohio Region Saves Baby Girl

Alexis Starnes will tell you that she's grateful for the knowledge and training she received during her time as a Girl Scout. In 2021, that training helped save the life of a small child. While feeding a 7-month-old girl baby food,

Starnes noticed that the child stopped responding. Starnes immediately recognized the signs of choking, unstrapped the child from her chair and began back blows to quickly dislodge the food. Starnes was the only person out of her graduating Girl Scout troop to renew her certification two years after she had received her initial training. "And I'm glad she did," her Instructor, Erin Hosek, said, adding how proud she is of Alexis for using those lifesaving skills that day. was assisting his parents at a garage sale when a shopper collapsed in the driveway. Recognizing the emergency, Boothby immediately called 911 and then initiated CPR. The responding ambulance team later said that Boothby's CPR saved the man's life. In addition to the Certificate of Merit signed by then-President Jimmy Carter, Boothby was also presented with personal letters of commendation extolling the value of his Red Cross training from then-U.S. Representative Olympia Snowe and then-U.S. Senators Edmund Muskie and William Cohen.
