



Off-Duty Officer Responds Quickly to Gym Emergency in the Northern California Coastal Region


Off-duty Police Officer Richard Castellon was walking through his apartment complex when he spotted an unconscious man in the gym. Without hesitation, he called 911, requested an AED and began CPR. Richard continued chest compressions until EMS arrived and helped to restore the man's pulse before he was transported to the hospital. For his courageous and selfless actions, Richard received the prestigious Red Cross Certificate of Merit. During the ceremony, Richard humbly dedicated the moment to the survivor and his family, saying, "I continue to keep them in my prayers." YMCA Team Members Honored for Heroic CPR Response in the Iowa and Nebraska Region


Melissa Pettit and Richard Donaldson were working their shifts at the local YMCA when a woman was found unresponsive in her vehicle. They acted swiftly and, utilizing their Red Cross training, gently removed her from the car and began CPR. Donaldson performing compressions while Pettit counted compressions and breaths. Their calm teamwork and rapid response kept the woman stable until EMS arrived. For their heroic actions, Melissa and Richard were honored with the Lifesaving Award for Professional Responders. This award recognizes on-duty individuals who use Red Cross training to save lives. Deputy's Quick Thinking Saves Child in Crisis in the Colorado and Wyoming Region

Deputy Tyler Mathis faced a life-or-death moment when a child went into anaphylactic shock. EMS was delayed and the child was struggling to breathe. Thankfully Tyler, an EMS clinician, sprang into action. His medical bag lacked an auto-injector, so he drew and administered epinephrine from a vial, staying calm under pressure. Thanks to his quick thinking, the child survived. For his heroic response, Tyler received the Certificate of Extraordinary Personal Action. 

Instructor Spotlight


Lang Yang


We extend our thanks to Lang for providing the quality training that allowed his student to take action when it mattered most.



Lifesaving Awards Vault

From the vault of the Daily Argus-Leader (Sioux Falls, IA), January 20, 1952

While making his afternoon rounds at a power plant, Elmer Anderson was alerted to an emergency at a sunken lily pool. He rushed over, spotted the foot of a small child barely visible among the plants and pulled the 2-year-old girl



from the water. He immediately began CPR and continued lifesaving efforts until the rescue squad arrived. Officials later confirmed that even

a few seconds' delay could have been fatal. For his swift and heroic actions, Elmer was honored with the Red Cross Lifesaving Award.
